## UNWE AND THE CHALLENGES OF THE COVID-19 EMERGENCY STATE

UNWE is not only a place for obtaining knowledge but also skills. It is not just a digitalization of several services, but it is part of the general strategy of UNWE.

The entire process related to the education of students is digitalized and paperless. Approved system for digital signing of academic protocols for already four years and the system of electronic general records has worked for already two years. Exams are conducted digitally, in test centers, including the Erasmus students. UNWE has developed and uses information system WEB Student for the student status, exams and examinations results with log in.


The university library - one of the largest libraries in the country gives free of charge access to the electronic database with economic, management, legal and other kinds of specialized literature, all over the world. It is natural that the following step was the E-Student Card.

UNWE is the first university in Bulgaria which brought into use the E-Student Card. The project E-Student Card of UNWE is an innovative business solution 3 in 1 - Student Book, Bank debit card and International Student Identity Card (ISIC), Their first owners became 4 000 first year Bachelor students who began their education in the academic year 2017. The plastic is like the identity card and contains a microchip with digital seal of UNWE, full student information about the owner as well as an individual sign of the student whose name is written in Cyrillic and Roman alphabet. There are two types E-Student Cards: complex one containing three components - E-Student Book, debit card and ISIC and single one including only E-Student Book. It is digitalized also the entire process related to the education of students on the base of key certificates for 200 lecturers and 30 officials, during the pilot year to eliminate any possible mistakes and unscrupulousness, valid for a year and issued by the UNWE to each lecturer, electronic signs, electronic general records, etc. At the UNWE there is an approved system for digital signing of academic protocols for already four years and the system of electronic general records has worked for already two years.

Moreover, UNWE has WEB Student In which a student can find actual information about student status, exams and examinations results if log into the information system WEB STUDENT in the UNWE website. For the purpose the student needs a PIN or PFN as well as a faculty number. Faculty number is obtained upon enrollment as students at the UNWE and PIN/PFN - when is issued an Identification Document. The same information as well as a lot of additional one could be find also directly by the information system STUDENT on the ground floor of the university. A faculty number and PIN/PFN are also needed for entry. Through it each student at any time at any of the nine devices located in the building of UNWE can be informed about the student status - grades, scholarships, health insurance, dormitories, all administrative services, academic schedule - sessions, lectures, exams, etc. There is also an application for smartphones to read the information in the E-Student Book.

UNWE has high capacity in digitalization and was fully prepared for the online education during the Emergency state due to the COVID9-19.

## ERASMUS REFLECTIONS

### on Impact and Feedback

Erasmus certainly is seen as a European success story. The figures easily support this view. The Erasmus programme was established in 1987 and is among the most popular EU programmes in education and training. During its first year, only 3,244 students went abroad and now enriched the lives of more than 10 million direct participants. Each year, more than 300,000 students now study or train under the Erasmus+ umbrella.

There's more than 80 per cent of Erasmus+ graduates are employed within three months of graduation, with 72 per cent stating their Erasmus+ experience helped them to have their first job. Nearly half of Erasmus+ trainees were offered a job in the company where they trained.

It is expected that this international experience has a positive impact on the personal development of the students and in particular on intercultural understanding and foreign language proficiency, but also on their academic development. Finally, the Erasmus experience is seen as beneficial for students to find their first job after graduation and for their early career.

Reports on the Erasmus experience by students often tell about an outstanding experience having a long-lasting impact on their lives and making them discover a new European identity.

Evaluation of the Erasmus teaching period abroad is overall positive. The most often reported beneficial effects are an enhanced intercultural understanding, an intensified use of scientific foreign language publications for teaching, new co-operations with partner programmes at the host institution, improved research contacts and a broadened own specialist knowledge.

The feedback of the Erasmus Students and Staff is considered a basic pillar in studies of the impact of the Erasmus mobility.

To monitor the on-going effectiveness and sustainability of the Erasmus mobility in compliance with the indicators set in the University Strategy for internationalization, the Incoming Students and Staff under Erasmus KA107 project from Morocco, Albania and Kosovo presents their successful Erasmus stories.

## WHO WE ARE?

**UNWE — University with a history of 100 years  
& 20 years of ERASMUS Experience**



University of National and World Economy (UNWE) is located in the capital city of Bulgaria – Sofia. It is the largest and the oldest higher educational institution for Economics and Management in Bulgaria.

The University originates from the Free University of Political and Economic Sciences established by Order No.2155 of July, 5th, 1920 of the Minister of National Enlightenment. In 1940 / State Gazette, iss. No.126 of June, 7th, 1940/ it was transformed into State Higher Institute of Finance and Administrative Sciences and in 1947 it was reorganized as a Faculty of Economic and Social Studies at Sofia University.

The autonomy of the University was restored under the name Higher Institute of Economics by Decree No.26 /"Messages", iss. No.10 of February, 1st, 1952/. In 1953 it was named after Karl Marx by Decree No.89 /" Messages", iss. No. 23 of March, 20th, 1953/.

On April, 27th, 1990 the Academic Council made the decision to reorganize Karl Marx Higher Institute of Economics as a University of National and World Economy. It was officially done by Decision of the National Assembly for establishment and transformation of higher educational schools /State Gazette, iss. No.68 of July, 7th, 1995/.

The University of National and World Economy (UNWE) is the oldest, most prestigious and largest economic university in South Eastern Europe. Annually, it offers training to more than 20 000 students. In 2018 the UNWE obtained for the third time the highest institutional assessment (9,65/10) among all Bulgarian universities from the National Agency for Evaluation and Accreditation (full member of the European Association for Quality Assurance in Higher Education (ENQA)). The University holds also a certificate of quality management system according to ISO 9001:2015 awarded by INTERTEK.

Human resources/Expertise - With its capacity of 505 academics, 86 of which professors and 195 associate professors, UNWE trains students in 47 undergraduate programs and 108 graduate programs (regular and distance learning). The university also offers training in 37 doctoral programs. Training is delivered at 8 faculties and 33 departments.

UNWE develops scientific knowledge in the areas of Economics, Sociology, Political Sciences, Management, Law etc. The research teams carry out in-depth research in the field of: strategic analyses of the Bulgarian economy and forecasts for its development, macroeconomics, analyses of the financial sector, social policy, entrepreneurship, the competitiveness of Bulgarian companies, agricultural policy and sustainable development, social management, foreign policy, national security etc.

For the previous year, UNWE implemented more than 100 research and education projects, comprising: 77 funded through the targeted subsidy for research activities; 11 projects funded by the National Science Fund and 10 projects funded by international programs.



UNWE further contributes to the publishing activities of its research staff through the university scientific editions – Yearbook of UNWE, Economic Alternatives (in English), Research Papers of UNWE, Economic and Social Alternatives. As of January 2016 the edition Economic and Social Alternatives has two new sections: “European Union” and “Economics Education”. The magazines Economic and Social Alternatives and Economic Alternatives are registered within the EBSCO indexing system through EconLit – the bibliographical database of the American Economic Association. In December 2017 UNWE began publishing the new specialised legal journal “Business and Law”.

In 2018 a total of 225 publications were published in UNWE’s scientific editions: Yearbook of UNWE, Research Papers of UNWE, Economic and Social Alternatives magazine, Economic Alternatives and Business and Law journal.

**Infrastructure and Facilities-** The university Academic Complex comprises 367 lecture rooms with 5298 seats and an overall area of 7166,40 m<sup>2</sup>. UNWE’s central building houses 196 tutorial rooms, research centres and labs, covering an area of 2496 m<sup>2</sup>.

UNWE’s Congress Centre offers excellent conditions for hosting academic and research forums. All halls are equipped with multimedia projection systems, free wireless Wi-Fi communication and a system for video capture, live streaming and storage of records in a digital archive.

The University Publishing Complex addresses the objectives of the educational and research process at UNWE by publishing textbooks, research conferences proceedings, materials for university projects.

The university library is keeping 542 616 volumes. Library’s e-resources provide free access to widely known electronic databases such as: EBSCO, Emerald, Elsevier (Scopus), Springer Link, Science Direct, Thomson Reuters (Web of Science) etc.

Since its establishment 100 years ago the UNWE faculty members and alumni are eminent scientists, government figures, prime ministers, ministers, deputies, politicians, the first Bulgarian European Commissioner after the Lisbon Treaty entered into force, the first Bulgarian - Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund /IMF/, the first Bulgarian - Director General of Eurostat, ambassadors, representatives of our country in authoritative international organizations, mayors, public figures, businessmen, bankers, etc. Over the last years graduates of UNWE are six of the Bulgarian Prime Ministers including the first woman prime minister.

Holders of the honorary title of Doctor Honoris Causa of UNWE are authoritative persons from Europe and the USA and among them are: Prof. Joseph Stiglitz and Prof. Paul Krugman, holders of the Nobel Prize in Economics, Franz Fischler, European Commissioner for Agriculture, Prof. Václav Klaus, President of the Czech Republic, Prof. Danuta Hübner, European Commissioner, Prof. Francis Gurry, Director-General of the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO), Jean Claude Trichet, President of the European Central Bank, Prof. Taleb Rifai, Secretary-General of the UN World Tourism Organization /UNWTO/, Irina Bokova, Director-General of UNESCO, etc.

Actually Agriculture University of Tirana is passing through an international accrediting process and the exchanges of experiences might be an excellent opportunity for Albanian professors in curricula and teaching programs. The short-term motility contributed to the reinforcement of the international dimensions of my career. When I was back in Albania I shared the Erasmus experience with my colleagues and as well with my students.

In the future It will be great if we can increase the quotas for both students and professors not only from sending institution but as well from receiving higher education institution " University of National and World Economy in Sofia " .
